

Buninyong Art Prize & Exhibition 2024: A Vibrant Celebration of Local Art

The 2024 Buninyong Art Prize & Exhibition was a resounding success, with an impressive 147 artworks displayed at the historic Buninyong Town Hall. The exhibition celebrated the creativity and talent of local and regional artists, drawing hundreds of visitors across the weekend and achieving the sale of 33 artworks. The event was held from Friday Night 18 October and ran throughout Saturday to Sunday 20 October 2024.

A highlight of the event was the announcement of the Community Bank Buninyong Acquisition Prize. Esteemed judge Barry Wemyss awarded the prize to Jon Crawley for his stunning watercolour, Our Historical Street - Buninyong. This beautiful piece, which captures the charm of Buninyong, will soon hang proudly on the walls of the Community Bank.

Opening Night saw over 100 attendees gather for an exciting evening that included refreshments, finger food, and the announcement of prize

winners. Barry Wemyss's thoughtful judging and appreciation for the artists' work added a meaningful touch to the evening.

The event was organised by Buninyong ARTpreneurs (a subcommittee of Buninyong Community Events Inc.) - local creatives Trudy Nicholson, Karen Garratt, Marg McKee, and Lisa Cressey, whose efforts helped establish this second Buninyong Art Prize as a cornerstone of the town's cultural life. Visitors enjoyed diverse artistic styles and mediums, from traditional landscapes to experimental works, all available for purchase.

What next

Looking ahead, the 2025 Buninyong Art Prize & Exhibition, scheduled for October 2025, aims to showcase even more local talent. The exhibition will continue to provide a platform for artists to share their work with the community.

From Sue Yorsten - President, Buninyong & District Community Association (BDCA). October 2024.

I'm writing this as I look back and ponder on my time with the BDCA. Firstly, has the BDCA made a difference? We have welcomed new members to the committee who bring their own vibe to the table. They give us fresh ways of looking at things that impact the town and have an eye for what could be rather than just what has been. We need to continue to work together with the council in the spirit of integrity and trust. We need to acknowledge that our council covers an area of 739sq kilometres with a population of approximately 122,000. Each area has their own competing, sometimes urgent priorities.

Village Voice

Following community consultation and with support from the Buninyong Community Bank, we engaged Shell Corcoran to oversee the implementation of a new local newsletter, the "Village Voice". We have had great feedback from the community following the initial publication. However, for me a vexed question is how will the newsletter survive? How do we assure its ongoing viability? Very few locals are prepared to be involved in the production of the newsletter. The small team we do have are committed and vibrant and making great efforts, but they also have other priorities in life. If anyone has any thoughts on how to attract more volunteers to the team, I would love to hear from you.

De Soza Park

Following on from the recent council elections, the BDCA will work with our local representative and interested community members to revisit the De Soza Park masterplan to ensure it reflects the way we all want to use the space now and into the future.

RV Friendly Town

We are continuing to work with interest groups to establish a Recreational Vehicle Friendly Town site. It has taken time to investigate several locations with a shortlist now in place.

Mt Buninyong Reserve

The previous Mt Buninyong Reserve Advisory Committee ceased in 2018 as it didn't fit the new reporting requirements under the new Local Government Act. Through discussions with Councillor Ben Taylor and Bridget Wetherall (Director Infrastructure and Environment), Council have acknowledged, that whilst the Snap, Send, Solve (SSS) application is the preferred method to report/manage maintenance issues, those identified on Mt Buninyong may be beyond the scope of SSS and warrant more detailed management.

The BDCA has, together with Council, established a new committee and structure to work on the management of the Mount. The intention is for this group to meet periodically and work cooperatively to ensure one of its greatest natural assets, Mount Buninyong, is kept in good condition. The new Mount Buninyong Maintenance Group will ensure the BDCA is aware of ongoing maintenance concerns on Mt. Buninyong itself. Examples include overgrowth of weeds and infestations and degradation of the South Walking Track. (Courtesy Darren Bowden).

Highway Safety

BDCA representatives continue to meet with the state government on the issue of safety on the Midland Highway as it passes through our town. It has been two years since the public meeting following the truck crash and nothing has changed. Should it, can it change and how? And importantly when? We need to continue to put pressure on the appropriate Departments, I think, to achieve a definitive outcome.

Someone local queried me when I joined this group. "Who and what is the Buninyong and District Community Association?" they asked. They were not newcomers to the area. I hope it is one thing that has started to change with the newsletter and the soon to be revamped BDCA website and Facebook page. To be relevant and express the views of the community the BDCA needs to hear from the community. The BDCA exists to represent the views of the community. An obvious way to do that is by survey so the BDCA will make every effort to listen to you to ensure its voice is the voice of the community.

Grace and Erin are two women with hidden pasts and precarious presents. Adam and Brodie are two men with thoughts of revenge on these women for past involvements and, in their eyes, injustices. Predatory, angry men. All live in a world of disguise and subterfuge, of always being alert and ready to run.

Grace and Adam are thieves and scammers, while Brodie uses technology to search for and track down his estranged wife, who escaped from him and a world of domestic violence and coercive control.

Although Grace is living on the wrong side of the law, she is not an evil person and at times she risks her own safety to help others. She is likeable and at times the reader sympathises with her and her circumstances and feels like they are on her side. She longs for a "normal" existence: to have friends, a regular and legal

income, neighbours and perhaps even a family ... a sanctuary ... but her present and her past keep derailing this desire.

Erin finds it hard to trust and has isolated herself in order to survive. Grace and Erin meet when Grace takes a job in Erin's antiques business in the Adelaide Hills and also becomes her tenant in Erin's granny flat. Grace uses her knowledge of artworks and memorabilia to be the 'frontman' of Erin's business.

About the author

Garry Disher is a famous Australian author who grew up on his parents' farm in South Australia. He has written more than 40 titles including general and crime fiction, childrens' books, textbooks and books about the craft of writing. He travelled to Ballarat in April this year to speak at the Ballarat Mechanics Institute.

One of his most popular characters is rural police constable Paul Hirschhausen in the Hirsch series set in outback South Australia with realistic small town characters.

Sanctuary is a stand alone novel, quite a different read from his other series, with a build up to an ending which tied together the storylines in the final pages. There was also a feeling that we might read more of the character of Grace and maybe Adam in the future. As is expected from a popular and prolific writer like Disher, Sanctuary is a well written, tightly structured crime novel that takes the reader on a suspenseful ride with fascinating characters and an atmospheric sense of place and time. Another great Australian novel to be recommended.

Buninyong Outdoor Pool has opened for Summer



The Graham Hannah Buninyong Pool opened on Saturday 30 November 2024. It features a solar heated 25m outdoor pool, shaded toddlers pool, BBQ and picnic facilities. The pool at 207 Forest Street, Buninyong, will provide welcome relief from hot days to all and sundry.

Prior to opening, the pool has received a fresh coat of paint, the water has been cleaned filtered and lightly chlorinated. The ducks have been gently encouraged to find a new place to paddle. Now all we have to do is wait for above 23 - degree days for the pool to operate. Grassy surrounds with trees and shade cloth for sun protection will add to the welcoming environment.

Hours of Operation:

During the 2024-25 summer season, the pool will be open during the following hours:

- Outside of school holidays
 - O Monday to Friday: 4pm to 7pm
 - Weekends and public holidays: 1pm to 6pm
- During school holidays
 - Monday to Friday: 1pm to 7pm
 - Weekends and public holidays: 1pm to 6pm

(In hot weather, it may stay open even later.)

The Kiosk will be open for refreshments, which will be particularly sought after by local children following long, hot days in classrooms. In addition, the pool provides safe water toys for kids and more importantly, lifesavers will also be on duty.

We all know how important swim safety is and to this end, VICSWIM Summer Kidz Program will be running at the Buninyong Aquatic Centre in January, hosted by Ballarat Aquatic & Lifestyle Centre. The dates for Buninyong are:

Week 1, 6-10 Jan; and Week 2, 13-17 Jan.

If you were curious to know what the ingredients were for the **French Apple Cake** recipe from our 1st Edition, here they are!

- 150g (1 cup) plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 125g butter, at room temperature, chopped
- 100g (1/2 cup) caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 60ml (1/4 cup) milk
- 3 large pink lady apples, peeled, cut into 2-3cm pieces
- Icing sugar, to dust

Baked Cheesecake with Strawberry Sauce

INGREDIENTS

Biscuit base

1/2 cup unsalted butter 2/3 cup Granita biscuits 1/3 cup caster sugar

Cheesecake

1 cup castor sugar 1000g softened creamed cheese 4 eggs 2 tbsp cornflour 200g sour cream Zest and juice of 1 lemon zested

Strawberry Sauce

250g strawberries trimmed and cut in halves 1/4 cup castor sugar

METHOD

Preheat oven to 130 C.

Grease and line a springform cake tin (23cm) with baking paper and set aside.

Melt butter and set aside.

Blend biscuits and sugar in a blender until a fine crumb then add melted butter.

Evenly press mixture into base of cake tin and place in fridge to set until needed.

Place sugar and 500g cream cheese into mixing bowl and mix until blended. Add remaining cheesecake ingredients, including the second 500g cream cheese and mix until well combined.

Pour filling over biscuit base then bake for 1 hour 30 mins or until firm with slight wobble.


Turn oven off but leave door open with cake inside to cool for 1 hour.

Place in fridge for minimum 4 hours or overnight.

Place strawberries and sugar in saucepan and cook on stove until strawberries are syrupy and soft.

Apply strawberry sauce to top of cheesecake prior to serving.

Serve with cream if desired as cream is wonderful with this cheesecake!

The Society held our 42nd Annual General Meeting on Thursday 17 October, at the Court House, (Buninyong Town Hall.) Our guest speaker was Susan Kruss who spoke on her doctoral research into the history of the Ballarat Field Naturalists Club, noting particularly the work done in protecting bushland in the Buninyong area.

On Saturday 19 October, the Society celebrated Buninyong's Treasures as part of History Month, when members were on hand at the Court House to show visitors

photos of the most treasured sites in Buninyong, and how they have been cared for.

Dr Anne Beggs-Sunter followed with an illustrated lecture on Buninyong's treasures, including the Botanical Gardens, Buninyong Town Hall, Buninyong Old Library and the house Ballantre. Anne will explain how a site gets nominated to the Victorian Heritage Register, what nomination means for owners, and the process of researching an historic house for nomination to the Register.

The Society is also working on a Wish List of sites that should be included on the Register, and should be included as part of the City of Ballarat's Heritage Gaps study. Suggestions warmly welcomed.

The Society warmly welcome new members to join us in our work of recording and promoting the history and heritage of our



A Snippet from the Past

Extracted from Sun News-Pictorial, Melbourne, 11 October 1935. Danger Signs To Be Erected On Highway BUNINYONG. — A danger triangle will be erected along the Geelong-Ballarat road—the Midland Highway—almost opposite Buninyong Fire Brigade, as a means of reducing the speed of motorists passing through the township. A white centre line was recently marked in by the Country Roads Board at the sharp turn from Learmonth Street to Warrenheip Street.



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SparkTank Event Distributes \$50,000 to Local Groups

Awards

Overall, the \$50,000 funding pool was awarded to ten of the local organisations, including:

- \$10,000 to Babies Above Incorporated;
- \$10,000 to Leigh Catchment Group Inc;
- \$7,000 to Ballarat Centre Against Sexual Assault
- \$6,500 to Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre;
- \$6,000 to Buninyong Primary School;
- \$4,500 to Bunanyung Landscape Alliance Inc; and
- \$1,500 apiece to Ballarat Police and Citizens Youth Club, Ballarat Pony Club Inc, Heartbeat Victoria Ballarat Branch, and York St Church of Christ (Reverse Advent Calendar initiative).

The SparkTank event highlighted the remarkable work being done by local volunteer groups and demonstrated the strong community spirit that defines the Buninyong and Ballarat areas. It brought together local organisations, funders, and residents to create a night of inspiration, support, and community engagement.

Reverse Advent Calendar

Reverse Advent Calendar representative Heather Luttrell spoke about the importance of her project: "In Ballarat, many individuals face food insecurity, and we know that for many families, Christmas is a particularly stressful time. Reverse Advent Calendars isn't just about giving; it's

about fostering connection and support within our community, and we're so grateful for this opportunity to pitch our project."

Community Gold Tokens

In addition to the community investment funding, the Community Gold tokens given to the audience allowed attendees to have a direct say in the distribution of additional funds. The total amount of Community Gold awarded on the night was \$2,740, which will be spent back within the participating community groups, further driving the event's impact.

Over the past 14 years, Community Bank Buninyong's Community Investment Program has returned over \$2.25 million of profit to the Community Bank Buninyong's highly anticipated SparkTank event took place on Tuesday 12 November at the Buninyong Town Hall, where local organisations pitched to a panel of judges for a share of \$50,000 in community investment funding. Over 140 people gathered in the town hall to support the community groups, with each attendee given \$20 worth of Community Gold tokens they could use to vote for their favourite community project of the night.

local community. The SparkTank initiative was designed to offer additional funding opportunities to local groups, focusing on strengthening the community's ability to address pressing issues. The company's Community Partnership Lead, Kelly Bevan, said, "We wanted to cast the net wider to include groups across the greater Ballarat region, some of whom we haven't supported before. It's also an exciting new way to engage the community and bring fresh energy to our program."

A Buningong Treasure Miss Middlemist

People have been riding bicycles around Buninyong for over 150 years. They were massively excited, especially by the speed of bicycles - velocipedes - as they came down the hill from Mount Helen.





From The Ballarat Star, 30/08/1869

On Saturday afternoon the quiet town of Buninyong was excited by the arrival of eight bicycles, the riders having journeyed from Ballarat. The locals of the ancient village carefully inspected the mysterious-looking conveyances.

To Buninyong and back will most likely become a favorite trip. The ride down the steep hill to Buninyong is quite exciting. The velocipede goes down at a great pace and the rider has to do nothing but sit still and guide.

Tricycles are seen, but they are more difficult to work, and, strange to say, more dangerous to ride. One small boy, about nine years of age, may be seen riding about on a bicycle, much to the delight of a large crowd of juveniles, who follow him unceasingly.

My favourite story of bicyclists in Buninyong concerns Miss Annie Middlemist who in her nineties was still riding her bicycle around "the ancient village." We need to know more about this incredible lady.

From The Argus, 04/09/1941

Miss Annie Middlemist, 94, retired school teacher, was an assistant at Rev. Thomas Hastie's Presbyterian school at Buninyong. She was teaching at Sale on her retirement 47 years ago. When she returned to Buninyong, she took her 45-year-old bicycle with her and amazed people by her cycling vitality. She had ridden the machine almost daily and her best feat was a ride of 40 miles (64 kilometres) in a day.

Miss Middlemist was an organist at the Presbyterian Church in girlhood. She was an active worker for the war efforts of 1914-18.

This picture (left), not of Miss Middlemiss of course, does show that the bicycle opened up a new, exciting world for the people of Buninyong, especially for ladies. Miss Middlemist led the way!

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The Old Swimming Baths, Buninyong Botanical Gardens

The Old Baths in the Botanical Gardens go back to the beginnings of local government in the early 1860s. The Borough Council on 16 January 1861 agreed that a sum not exceeding £40 could be spent on a bathing house on the upper Botanical Gardens reserve.

The Baths were opened to the public in March 1872. In 1876 a Baths Committee agreed on fees of six shillings for a family ticket for a season, three shillings for an individual and tuppence for a single visit. It was part of the duties of the curator of the Gardens to also superintend the baths. At this time private bathing facilities were minimal, hence the importance of the public baths.

The Baths were fed by natural springs that flow into the Gong, a large dam above the gardens which feeds water down the hillside towards the centre of the township.

The basin of the baths was made of bluestone. At the end of World War I, Shire Engineer C.C.P. Wilson obtained a repatriation grant of £749 and organised a team of ex-servicemen to construct improved swimming baths, with prestressed concrete walls and changing rooms. This was a very early use of pre-stressed concrete.

Segregated bathing was enforced, and children from the next door school came for swimming lessons. During the 1930s, the baths were closed due to a high E. coli count. After World War II, the Baths became overgrown with weeds. However

they were cleaned up in the 1950s, and pupils from the Primary School got their Herald 'Learn-to-Swim' certificates at the baths in 1953.

In 1969, a group of citizens began lobbying for a new swimming pool for Buninyong, and the old baths lay empty and neglected, quickly overgrown with ivy and blackberry.

After a visit to England in 1992, local councillor Derick Leather had the idea of revamping the old baths, and drew up a plan to make a garden, following an idea from Sidmouth in Devon. This was pursued, and the baths were transformed into a tranquil sunken garden, one of the last projects of the old Buninyong Shire Council. They became a popular venue for weddings.

In 2019, Ballarat City Council suddenly closed off the area, erected a fence around it, and declared that the walls were unstable, while they investigated leaks from the Gong wall along Cornish Street.

Six years later, the wire fence still surrounds the baths, which are overgrown with weeds again, waiting for work to start on stabilising the walls and reviving the garden. Would it have taken so long to act if the baths were in the Ballarat Botanic Gardens?

Emmaus Peace Pole

Peace Poles are significant 'monuments' to draw attention to the important 'prayer'.
"May Peace Prevail On Earth" ~
Madonna Quixley.

Earlier in the year, I was in the fortunate position to accompany student leaders at Emmaus Catholic Primary School to the formal launch of Compassionate Ballarat's 'Seeds of Compassion' project at their dedicated garden bed on Victoria St, Ballarat East. Compassionate Ballarat is a volunteer organisation encouraging compassionate decision - making and actions in our city.

The Project

This project entailed planting seeds of compassion to promote Ballarat as a caring city supported by the compassionate wishes of its future leaders. Our students took their wishes and physically handed them to members of the Compassionate Ballarat team alongside the garden.

Whilst at the launch the students and I were privileged to experience a profound encounter with Madonna Quixley, the co-convenor of Let's Talk Peace Ballarat. This encounter was the beginning of the Peace Pole project at Emmaus. We liaised with Madonna over time to recently unveil and bless our very own Peace Pole that now stands proudly in our school grounds as a place to contemplate peace in our world. Our Peace Pole is the third Peace Pole now in Ballarat schools. For the broader community there is another in Barkly Square.

History

The Peace Pole movement was started in Japan by the visionary Masahisa Goi. He was deeply distressed by the catastrophic devastation caused by the atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, instantly killing 200,000 people. In 1955, he began a mission to spread the simple message, "May Peace Prevail on Farth."

Emmaus' Peace Pole

Our Peace Pole stands as a symbol of unity and respect. The inclusion of the message "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in our four chosen languages on each side of the pole, were carefully selected as important elements of our school story:

- The message in Wadawurrung language acknowledges the traditional custodians of the land on which our school sits, honouring their enduring connection to this place.
- The Japanese language reflects our commitment to fostering cultural understanding, and our place and role in a global context, through our languages program.
- Braille signifies our dedication to inclusivity, ensuring all voices are heard and valued in our community.

Together, these languages embody the principles of respect, learning, and belonging that guide us to a world filled with peace. Our Peace Pole would not have been possible without the generosity of Madonna and her friends at Let's Talk Peace Ballarat in

partnership with the Rotary Club of Ballarat South who co-sponsored the cost of our Peace Pole. We feel deep gratitude to have engaged in dialogue with Madonna at the time of the Compassionate Ballarat "Seeds of Compassion" project and Compassionate Ballarat's role is also acknowledged on an attribution plaque on the Peace Pole alongside the other sponsors.

As a school of faith, hope and love, our prayer is to spread the message of peace and hope for both current and future generations.

Movement Matters is an exercise class for seniors involving movements to music while seated in a chair. It may sound simple, but these movements are all purposeful; they stimulate brain function and improve stability, gait and balance. The program is driven toward improving its participants' range of movement, strength flexibility, agility, fitness, mental health and social wellbeing.

The sessions are curated for participants; music is matched to the class's age group, and routines are adjustable for participants to do what they can—taking into account body limitations, injuries, or recovery from injury.

Participants find the classes fun and a good challenge. Through exercising in a light hearted, non-competitive atmosphere, group members revel in the physically and mentally rewarding activities. Particularly for those who live alone, the classes are a great opportunity to get out of the house, meet new people and have a chat. It

allows attendees to join-in on the social gettogethers afterwards. Your body will thank you for joining a session.

How it started

In 2020 during Covid, Catherine Ross, a local Remedial and Bowen therapist, started looking into creating a seated movement class for seniors, and founded Movement Matters 55+ as a result. This year, Catherine Ross participated in the City of Ballarat run 'Buninyong Age-well Mini Expo' in March and was subsequently approached to run this initiative for six weeks on Thursdays, 11am—11:45am. Cost is \$5 per session and held in the Buninyong Town Hall. After commencing in July, the program was so successful that it has continued for the remainder of 2024. The program was free this year in October to celebrate Seniors Week.

Back next year

There is no compulsory attendance; group members turn up when they can, and anyone



aged 55+ is welcome to join. Movement Matters recommences February 2025.

CFA: MORE THAN FIRES AND VEHICLE ACCIDENTS

Your local Buninyong/Mt Helen Fire Brigade is involved in a wide range of activities throughout the year, not just in the busy summer fire season. On average the Brigade attends 3-4 call-outs per week, covering the urban areas of Buninyong, Mt Helen and Mt Clear as well as the rural areas of Lal Lal, Clarendon, Scotchman's Lead and Durham Lead. Further afield the Brigade supports the areas out to Dereel, Napoleons, Mt Doran, Mt Mercer, Elaine and Meredith.



Community Education

The Brigade is actively involved in community Fire education, visiting all local pre-schools, kindergartens, primary schools and secondary colleges. Individual visits are also provided on request to assist with smoke detector, fire extinguisher and house protection preparations. Community wide Fire Awareness meetings are held generally prior to the summer season. For these to be effective, increased public participation is essential. The Brigade has also carried out a program in recent years to alert residents, particularly in the urban fringe and rural sections, of planning for high risk fire days. Again, community involvement is crucial for this 'Plan B' initiative to be helpful in times when your Brigade may not be able to directly assist individual households.

Fund Raising

Perhaps less widely known are the fund-raising activities where members of the Brigade offer their assistance to the wider Victorian community. Each Good Friday for the past few years members have rattled the cans along the roadside raising money for the Royal Children's Hospital. This year members collected \$9,931.

More recently, twelve members trained amongst the University stairwells over ten weeks in preparation for the Melbourne Fire Fighters Stair Climb. This fund raising event on behalf of Crisis Support & Cancer Research involved members in full structural gear, including Breathing Apparatus, climbing 28 stories in the Crown Metropol building. Each member carried 25kg of gear! The Brigade raised nearly \$31,000, second on the overall listing of Brigades.

Individually, Lt Tom Prunty raised \$8,865 for the Appeal.

Calendar Run

The local community is very supportive in donating to the Brigade during the annual Calendar Run conducted in November each year. The Calendar Run provides the Brigade with a further opportunity to assist the community with additional Fire awareness tips.

As an all-volunteer Brigade, members cover the local area 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year Do not hesitate to ask for advice or assistance when members are in your area.


