

SparkTank Comes to Buninyong

The all-of-community event will see selected community groups pitch for their share of up to \$50,000* of community investment funding on the one night after months of application preparation and selection processes taking place.

Community Investment Committee Chair Debbie Rybicki said "we had an

incredible turn out to our information session, there's been so many groups come up with incredible project concepts and we've been rapt with the professionalism of the applications received. I'm really excited about the idea of Buninyong coming together at our SparkTank event, not only because our funding will create lasting legacies, but for people to network, learn off each other and socialise together".

Community Bank Partnerships Lead Kelly Bevan said "we're looking for the community to come along on the night and support the groups whether they are a part of them or not. It's going to be quite a thrill for us to distribute up to \$50,000 and the more energy and

excitement in the room the better. We'll also be joined by our panel of community representative 'Sparks' George Fong, Ellen Jackson and our very own Debbie Rybicki will be judging and awarding funds on the night", Community Bank Buninyong invites the local community to attend and participate in the distribution of these funds. SparkTank will be a FREE event, however tickets will be required to ensure adequate seating and catering. Tickets will go online in October via the information website www.sparktank.org.au.

A Mover and Shaker

Barry Fitzgerald was awarded an Order of Australia Medal on Australia Day 2024 for service to the community of Buninyong.

This article is to acknowledge the contribution to Buninyong's community spirit by Barry who previous to becoming the tireless Editor of the Buninyong News for seven years, had pursued an impressive career in academia, the Law Society, and health administration.

Barry's community efforts include the following:

As a leader in the Community
Association, Barry chaired many
public meetings including at election
times and on other occasions. He was
a member of the small team who,
along with John Emery, Ron Delaland
and others, worked to convince the

Bendigo Bank to establish a Community Bank in Buninyong. This has become a significant community asset with its focus on assisting local projects. Barry subsequently became a founding Director of the Bank serving from 2009 to 2014.

It was Barry Fitzgerald -and his wife Gayle Adams - who led many of the beautification projects in Buninyong such as the vines on the verandahs, the street signage, the large stone signs at the four entrances to the town, and the installation of plaques on historic buildings. In 2017 he put great effort into the project to restore Buninyong's 1917 Avenue of Honour. In this he worked closely with the local RSL.

Barry has compiled and edited all five editions of the Buninyong Visitor Guide. Currently, he is Chairman of the Buninyong Cemetery Trust where he has led many recent improvement projects.

Buninyong is all the better for Barry and Gayle choosing to retire in the town.

Both are public spirited. Gayle was a very effective Secretary and President of the Community Association over many years, and is the long-term Executive Assistant at the Committee for Ballarat. Many others got behind their endeavors, but it takes someone to lead. In that both Barry and Gayle excelled!

Our Heritage, Our Future

The Friends of Buninyong Botanic Gardens commissioned a report which is about to be released called "Our Heritage, Our Future". Residents would be aware the City of Ballarat is planning to demolish and reconstruct the Gong wall between the Heritage Victoria listed Upper and Lower Gardens, despite community objections, Community passion for protecting the heritage values of the Buninyong Botanic Gardens is reflected in the report. It is noted expert advice from a leading independent Heritage Consultant firm commissioned by Council cautioned, "Reconstruction of a new dam wall will have detrimental impacts on the cultural heritage significance of the Buninyong Botanic Gardens."

The "Our Heritage. Our Future" report proposes that Council considers an alternative approach to remediation works at the Gong. This alternative would not cause the heritage degradation potentially being inflicted by Council's plan.

One recommendation is about the design with implementation of a wetland to the east of The Gong dam wall. A series of water holding ponds would obviate the need for destruction of landscape and position the Gong as a community asset. It allows responses to climate change and avoids loss of bio-diversity and destruction of habitat. Such an option would allow for preservation of the existing Gong wall and its vegetation. This allows for retention of

fishing and water-based activities in the dam. Environmentally, this approach would increase vegetation cover for shade and cooling, provide habitat for birds and other native species and, in step with Council's position on biodiversity, create opportunities to rethink the Gardens' plant collections through the implementation of a strategic corridor connecting the Gong to outlying remnant bushland.

Maintaining Mt Buninyong

How lucky we are to have Mt Buninyong on our doorstep. Locals and tourists visit the Mount all year round. Preserving one of our most significant natural assets for current and future generations to enjoy, is of utmost importance for the local community.

Buninyong and District Community Association (BDCA) is bringing together local residents and council representatives to better understand the planned maintenance schedule, bring awareness of current issues requiring attention and explore how community volunteers can partake in works.

This is designed to build upon the work of the previous Mt Buninyong Reserve Advisory Committee which ceased in 2018. Initial discussions have focused on weed control, signage, upkeep of Zig Zag and South tracks and road surfacing.

Local Buninyong resident Roly Nam said "Together, with council, we walked along some of the tracks which had serious maintenance issues with signage, surface, obstructions and subsidence. We discussed the control required of the Elderberry trees along the south and southwest of the Reserve. Along the roadside embankments we looked at the required plantings of Derwent Speedwell, Boot lace bush and golden tips."

Local residents and the BDCA look forward to working toward upkeep of the Mt Buninyong Reserve. If you are interested in being involved, please contact news.bdca@outlook.com.

Cricket is back

Buninyong Cricket Club has a long history of representing and supporting the Buninyong community, with the club first formed in January of 1858.

At its heart, Buninyong Cricket Club is a community club, committed to providing opportunities for everyone in our community to participate in healthy, safe and inclusive cricket activities in a fun and family orientated environment. The Club's amazing dedicated team of volunteers tirelessly provide their skills, time and assistance to ensure the club can offer a variety of structured programs and social events, adding to the great culture of the club. We encourage anyone, player or not, to jump in and get involved.

In recent years we've transitioned from the Ballarat District Cricket Association to the Ballarat Cricket Association - enabling us to install what is widely considered one of, if not, the best turf wickets in the region. To complement this we have established a relationship with Federation University (Mt Helen Campus) that gives us access to two hard wicket grounds for our junior teams. In season 2023-24 the club had 5 senior teams (including 1 female side), 6 junior teams (including 2 female sides) and Woolworths Cricket Blast program. This year we hope to further strengthen our commitment to women's cricket and add 2 more female sides (1 senior and 1 junior U11).

As with most local sporting clubs we are slowly but surely recovering and



rebuilding our club to the glory days of pre-COVID-19. Whilst we have seen success in our junior club - with two premierships in the past three years - we hope to build on this with senior side success this year, with new player signings and the addition of new playing Senior Head Coach, Jack Sheppard.

Jack comes to us directly from his playing career with Aberfeldie Cricket Club (VTCA) and is a very experienced and successful cricketer having played over 250 premier games, with 80+ of those in the 1st XI. Jack has won multiple bowling awards and even picked up the prized scalp of the 'Big Show' Glen Maxwell!

Jack's experience will bolster the entire club, with senior finals action a definite possibility for the coming season.

French Apple Cake

Recipe submitted by Rheannon Mann, CWA Buninyong

- 150g (1 cup) plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 125g butter, at room temperature, chopped
- 100g (1/2 cup) caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 60ml (1/4 cup) milk
- 3 large pink lady apples, peeled, cut into 2-3cm pieces
- Icing sugar, to dust

Step 1

Preheat oven to 180C/160C fan forced. Grease a 21cm springform pan and line the base with baking paper.

Step 2

Sift the flour and baking powder into a bowl. Use electric beaters to beat the butter and sugar in a separate bowl until pale and creamy. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in the vanilla.

Step 3

Fold the flour mixture and milk (or rum, if you're using it instead of milk) into the butter mixture, then fold through the apple. Transfer to prepared pan and smooth the surface. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. Set aside in the pan for 10 minutes, before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Sten 4

Serve the cake dusted with icing sugar.




Hotel Update



On 25th July 2024 Friends of Buninyong Botanic Gardens members and Council Gardens staff were in attendance at the Gardens with long-time Buninyong resident Miriam Powell and her family to observe the planting of a new Indian Bean Tree (Catalpa bignonioides).

The Indian Bean Tree is one of a number of rare trees in the Buninyong Botanic Gardens. It is a deciduous tree, growing to around 12 metres. Its large broad leaves, up to 20 cm across, are green on top and fuzzy below, producing a licorice/aniseed smell when bruised.

The fragrant flowers are very attractive, in large upright clusters of many frilly white flowers with yellow and purple blotches. These are followed by clusters of long, pendulous, bean-like seed pods, hence its common name.

Officially, <u>Catalpa bignonioides</u>, the Indian Bean Tree hails from southeastern USA.



Originally an Indian Bean tree had been planted in 1988 in tribute to Miriam's late husband, builder John (Jack) who was associated with various community projects and developments around the township. This tree had been damaged and hence Council's decision to replace

the tree and invite Jack's family to the new planting.

Subsequent to this occasion, on the 12th September 2024, Miriam Powell died aged 98 yo. Miriam had lived a remarkable life marked by resilience, independence and a quiet strength that defined her.

As a dedicated nurse she was compassionate, meticulous and always committed to the well being of others. Her unwavering sense of duty and care touched many lives both professionally and personally.

Her family notice includes the words "Jane Austin once wrote "There is no charm equal to the tenderness of heart". Though not one for outward displays, Miriam showered her care through her actions, her wisdom and her steadfast presence. She will be missed by all who had the privilege of knowing her."

The Village Voice wishes to pass on the community's condolences to Miriam Powell's family upon her recent passing.

The presence of the Indian Bean tree in our gardens will continue to honour and remind us of both Jack and Miriam Powell.

Reimagining the use of a church building!

In country villages such as Buninyong, church buildings and faith communities occupy important places in the cultural psyche of people. For some nostalgic, for others respect for the historical presence these buildings offer.

For a regularly gathered community the church is an expression of spiritual faith and service. Buninyong is fortunate to have an iconic church building located on an acre of land, with beautiful green space and elm trees.

Today, spiritual life for many is associated with community cohesion, cultural diversity, and inclusion, planetary care, justice and deepening our respect and love through all our relating. Might love and valuing others be internalised as the God-image we carry in our lives. It may be a deep desire to be larger, more generous in our thinking. For many ideas and beliefs attributed to 'God', have become exhausted and stretched by the agitation and curiosity involved in the quest to find meaning. What remains alive in us, despite divergent and strong views, is the passion to engage and explore. Our ideas of the sacred can become too heavy, unrelatable and irreconcilable with the world. For many

For many church buildings convey an age which has slipped into a past world. Yet we are all in this human-earth project of being generative and cocreators of life. We share the perils and opportunity to find harmony. Might this itself be an emergent understanding of God, (ultimate reality) teasing rather than confining our deepest longings. So how might traditional religious spaces become daring and affirming places for inquiry, celebration and connectivity?

What if church buildings could be seen as community assets, investments others have made in shaping community and spiritual life. Could these iconic historic sites resonate with our highest and loftiest intentions? My hope is the distant and forgotten, might be reimagined and activated into a new appreciation of place and symbol. This public asset may be re-imagined as a community asset with the space being more purposeful than one hour on a Sunday.

Time To Start Preparing Your Property For The Coming Bushfire Season

Winter is over and now is a great time to get out in the garden to prune, trim back bushes and generally tidy up our yards and surrounding bush areas. Consequently, it is the ideal time to assess the fire safety issues on your property.

Buninyong Mt Helen Fire Brigade is encouraging people to use the cooler months of Spring to start preparing their properties for the upcoming bushfire season. This preparation applies equally to urban and rural properties.

There are many simple things you can do around your house to reduce fire risk. Reducing the fuel load reduces fire risk. Less fuel slows the fire and it burns with less heat.

Suggestions to get you started with your fire hazard reduction work include:

- Clearing any branches overhanging your house or decking. Where possible, keep tree branches and shrubs more than 10 metres from buildings, particularly next to or under windows.
- Breaking up the fuel have gravel pathways, use fire resistant plantings in garden beds, and trim lower branches of trees. Fire needs a path for fuel to travel. Break up this path!
- Reducing grass to less than 10 cm, particularly in rural areas or urban blocks adjoining bushland.
- Cleaning up fallen or hanging bark and any flammable materials under trees. Fire accelerates rapidly upward in our eucalypt settings.

There are many other helpful ideas to assist in your 'tidy-up' program. The CFA has produced an excellent booklet called "Your Guide to Property Preparation" to help you. It can be found at -

If you are having a burn of any sort it's important to notify your neighbours and register your burn on 1800 668 511. This reduces the chances of an unnecessary call-out by your local volunteer brigade. Again, this applies to both urban and rural areas.

Lost Rare Trees

In the 1990s a rare tree was found on Mount Buninyong. It is called Acacia Nano-dealbata (Dwarf Silver Wattle). Acacia Nano-dealbata is not only rare but an important plant. It can be used to restore native woodland, particularly on volcanic soils. It is also often grown as an ornamental and is cultivated commercially for its flowers and its essential oil.

Seeds were taken from the tree by Upper Williamson's Creek Landcare and propagated by Ballarat Wild Plants.

Twenty resulting seedlings were then

subsequently planted by the community in the vicinity where the last tree had been found.

Tree guards to protect the new seedlings were supplied by the City of Ballarat but unfortunately some were removed and the plants destroyed. However, twelve remained and were flourishing.

Sadly, in November 2020, a fire occurred on the Mount in the location where the trees were growing. All were lost except one. Landcare has replanted more of this species around the area and plan to harvest seeds to reestablish the tree on Mount Buninyong. Contributor: Roly Nam
